Needs of the Marines

You have all been great about sending stuff to take care of your Marines. It is nearly impossible to give you an exact number on any one item we need here as we are trying to control a city and my few marines are spread all over it at any given time. It's not Hartford

size or style, as you have seen from pictures; it would be more like Enfield size with a population of about 300,000 and growing. I never really have all the Marines together at any one time to sit and talk anymore so if you can just send a little of everything we list you all won't go broke and my Marines will get a little something from home. They usually come in, get sleep, grab some health and comfort items, and go back out to give you an idea. I mention Enfield as I live there and love the town.

What we can use

1. Magazines

2. Pillows (they are a very hot commodity here.) I will try to get a count. It can be little, big, it doesn't matter. At least your neck doesn't hurt when you wake up that way.

3. Some type of glasses cleaner. As our ballistic goggles get covered in sweat and salt and get hard to see out of.

4. Anything we can spray on a mattress to get rid of fleas, bed bugs or whatever it is that is biting us. They are definitely on the mattresses, not mosquito's though.

5. Insect repellent yes, as the mosquito's are picking up on us at the rapid rate (They have decided to join with the rats). We have a lot of standing sewage water here. Adds to the scenery though. Like having lakes around our hotel.

6. Baby wipes. Beats the issued sandpaper and leaves the skin when in a port-a-john.

7. Disposable razors or replacements. Razors don't last long here due to all the dirt on us.

8. 3x5 American Flags

9. Hand sanitizer. At least we try to be clean.

10. Golds Bond powder. This is like putting a band aid on the smell, But it does add a pleasantness to the stench.

11. Q-tips. Ears full of sand is interesting to say the least. We go through these daily.

12 AA batteries. We actually have a lot of gear for night Patrols that run on these and demand exceeds supply. They are getting a lot out here but not enough.

13. If some one can come up with one set of boxing gloves and hand wraps. We have a sea bag that the Marines punch on from time to time to release frustration but you can't really let loose for fear of breaking hands. It would be appreciated.

I have been receiving e-mails almost daily from 1st Sgt. Granger on what has been going on and what they are experiencing. It is not a pleasant situation for them at all, but somehow He and his men are keeping a positive attitude and sense of humor through all this.

Our Chapter is going to be collecting any and all items needed by these men, to be shipped over to them, so their time spent away from home can be as comfortable as possible. They did a great service for us for Tommy's Funeral and it is a way that we can show them our thanks and support.

Please bring any items to be sent to them to our next meetings, May or June, so we can get them boxed and shipped ASAP.

1st Sgt. Granger also sent this along in his e-mail and it made me think back 38 plus years ago and it will probably make you think back.

The Crack

No doubt you may have heard the crack of a rifle or hand gun in your life time. You may have shot one with the scouts or on a farm. You may have even heard a car back fire and thought it was a shot. But have you ever heard a shot on the other end? See a gun makes a distinct crack as it shoots the projectile out of the barrel. If measured it could be said that the bullet reaches max speed at the same time the gasses release from the end of the barrel. There is that crack all in one, the pin hitting the primer, exploding into powder, which sends gasses down a contained tube, know as the barrel. The gas must go forward, going faster and faster, until it reaches the end of the barrel where it can go in any direction. Depending on the charge and type of round it could be traveling 3100 feet per second. That is what mine travels at, as it leaves my barrel. But what happens on the other end? That is what we hear. For if it is near you, when it goes by you, there is a distinct second crack. The thing is, it has to be very near you to hear it. A few too many yards left or right and you won't hear it crack a second time. It is when you hear that second crack, that your heart skips a beat, you take mental note of your body to see if something feels different, and you run for cover like you never ran before. For you know someone has their sites on you. You take cover, thank the lord, and return fire, for you have just made it through another day.

OTHER AREA NEWS

St. Ann's Cares, a committee of St. Ann's Social Justice Committee, has for eleven (11) years, rehabilitated shelters in the Hartford area and homes of the needy in the Farmington Valley. This year the volunteers have taken on 3 projects and one of the projects is the Connecticut State Veterans Home in Rocky Hill. The two other projects were the V-US Bloomfield Retreat House, and the Immaculate Conception Shelter.

On May 6th and 7th, of this year, after 9 months of planning, teams composed of local citizens and Connecticut's Veterans from throughout the state, will descend on the State of Connecticut Veterans Home in Rocky Hill to perform once again "the miracle" which is possible through a St Ann's Cares program. On that Saturday and Sunday, busloads of t-shirted volunteers will sweep through the four facilities cleaning and painting two floors each of 4 buildings containing bedrooms, bathrooms, kitchens, staff offices and utility rooms.

Inside work will include: Replacement of all windows and storm doors. Kitchens and bathrooms will be remodeled, and all rooms will be cleaned, painted and furnished through donations.

Outside work will include: Trees and bushes will be planted and trimmed. The land will be landscaped throughout, a playscape for visiting children and an outdoor veteran sitting area built through donations. Two roofs will be resingled.

Work will start two weeks prior by "special preparation teams" and could extend up to three weeks after by "finishing teams" that work random days until completion. Sign-up will take place immediately up to May 6th with all signed up volunteers reporting for registration at the site. Food and liquid will be provided. Transportation will be provided from St Ann Church in Avon, CT.
